

Implement our sustainability program by integrating it into our operations and processes




Why Climate Change matters to MtS



























Split by Country

GENDER DIVERSITY





A BALANCED AND DIVERSE REGION

- Overall, MtS East Asia has a higher % of women staff
- HK has a higher representation of women as compared to the rest of the countries
- Female to Male ratio in the other regions is almost balanced



IN CONCLUSION

Observations

- East Asia accounts for 37.5% of MtS Emissions, second after the UK & Europe. However East Asia is also the largest operating direct-control region by employees
- Hong Kong contributes to a larger percentage of the footprint, but the size of operation is commensurate with the emissions
- Emissions include some one-time costs such as sale of property, which should normalise over the years



- Await final carbon footprint report from Climate Stewards
- Develop a carbon-reduction plan for each region aligned with the region's operations
- Assess Employee & Volunteer Initiatives for the region and develop a plan to increase engagement
- IHQ to improve data collection and mechanisms for the 2023 ESG Report
